

Normal service will be resumed as soon as possible

Do you recall that message appearing on TV screens when they had a glitch in transmission? It still appears when the winds affect masts nearby. I was thinking about the phrase recently contemplating the same thing about our service patterns and times; some of which have had to be changed at short notice lately.

In the past, as a parish, we've been blessed with the assistance of one or more active honorary assistant priests in retirement or working at Rochester Kings School. This meant daily mass as well as Sunday services, and also weddings and funerals, were celebrated without hiccup or hinder. Such cover is now no longer readily available; nor likely to be in the foreseeable future.

'Normal service' in S.John's has, of late, and might (over the holiday period and beyond) have to vary - despite advertised times. I do apologise about this: especially when people might turn up for a mass and find its either happened earlier or will be later, or has moved from morning to evening times (and vice versa).

Meetings in the Diocese, Deanery, School etc., are usually fixed well in advance and I can give

ample notice about changes while we're short staffed. However sometimes notice may only be given on the previous Sunday's bulletin sheet. We also try to put it on the website and social media.

During holiday periods as there is no one on hand to offer daily mass we are having to find people from as far away as Canterbury. It is very hard to get cover these days so daily mass – which is primarily offered for God's glory not just our good – may need time changes. When I need to be elsewhere and can preside (which I try to do) its sometimes just 15 minutes difference. Sadly 'spare priests' are a rarity in the C of E all the time not just for normal summer leave of other clergy.

Do, please, support our half-hour services and to the faithful band who help us keep 'normal service' running smoothly, I thank you for your patience. Moreover, I ask regulars to let us know if they can't be present. We can then 'rally the troops' and maintain our proud tradition of offering mass daily. Offered, as we say at the heart of each mass, '*for the praise and glory of His name, for our good, and the good of all his holy Church*'.

A LOWER THAMES CROSSING MEETING WITH KCC took place on Wednesday 5 July - it was good to hear about **KCC's strong opposition to any junction on the A226, and their demand for additional tunnelling of the link road.**

Representatives from Higham, Shorne, and Chalk met with senior members and officers of Kent County Council at County Hall to discuss mitigation measures for the proposed Crossing east of Gravesend.

The meeting, arranged by Gravesham Rural County Councillor Bryan Sweetland, was attended by Matthew Balfour, KCC Cabinet Member for Planning, Highways, Transport and Waste, and his deputy Michael Payne, together with Transport Strategy Manager Joe Ratcliffe and Katie Pettitt, Principal Transport Planner.

At the meeting, KCC listened to our concerns, and shared their views on mitigation requirements not just for the immediate area, but also with regards to the impact on traffic on the A226, A227, A228, and surrounding roads and villages.

KCC also shared their proposed design drawings for the link road which they have recommended to Highways England and which, if adopted, would go a long way towards mitigating many of the worst impacts of the crossing and link road.

Clearly there is still a lot of detail to address as the design is developed, and it was agreed that the parties would continue to liaise so that KCC can keep us updated on developments, and we can ensure that local concerns are taken into account.

Higham Parish Council was represented by Peter Allinson, with Susan Lindley and Bob Lane from Shorne, and Rev. Nigel Bourne from Chalk.

A WEEKEND IN WALSINGHAM

When you go to The Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham in Norfolk for the first time, as I did in June, you go with certain expectations. But I was soon reminded that our God is a God of surprises, and I expect that even Les Baker – who was on his 50th pilgrimage this year! – finds that there are always new things to learn and new messages to hear. And of course each time you go, you are in a different place and God meets you where you are.

The grounds of The Shrine are beautiful and the early summer flowers were in glorious bloom. (We were lucky with the weather, with not a drop of rain until we left.) The Shrine Church is beautiful inside, too, with colourfully decorated chapels and twinkling prayer candles.

But after the First Visit to the Holy House, the centre-piece of the Shrine, and Stations of the Cross I began to see that God had a different weekend in mind for me than the one I might have imagined or planned. And so I left behind those preconceptions, determined to be open to what God brought to the two days. The beautiful surroundings and the wonderful people who are on pilgrimage with you, the priests who minister to you and the services of prayer and sacrament: all are a help to what is really happening – God at work in your soul.

On Sunday morning, Fr James led Mass for the group of 16 from St John's Church – plus Brother Fabian down from Mirfield – in the Holy House when we offered the many petitions for prayer that had been given to us. This is always a special time when we can lift up the needs of others and of the whole world, and can offer our thanksgivings.

You can do a lot of walking on pilgrimage and will want comfortable shoes. Some of us walked the Holy Mile from the Shrine to the Slipper Chapel barefoot, which sounds a very spiritual exercise, but it was fun, as well as time for some more serious conversations with fellow pilgrims. You also do a lot of standing and kneeling (but of course you can always sit if you need to) and one of our party even brought her own kneepad.

Having not grown up in the Anglo-Catholic tradition, I wondered what a pilgrimage to a Marian shrine might be like. Mary, as expected, is given honour and praise, and we heartily sang “Ave Maria” during the

candlelit procession. But it is not called “England’s Nazareth” for nothing – it really is all about Jesus.

The village of Little Walsingham is charming. There was time to visit the shops and to wander through the lovely Abbey ruins and grounds opposite the Shrine. This site of the original Holy House was destroyed during the Reformation and is now a haven of peace.

Have I inspired you to join us for a pilgrimage to Walsingham? Members from St John’s go every year. Try it. You might be surprised!

HIGHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Following a warm welcome from Chairman, Jennifer Papadopoulos opened a meeting of Higham Parish Council, held on Monday June 26 in Higham Memorial Hall.

The evening's agenda began with routine matters and Councillors were informed of the decision by Joanne Raff, to resign for personal reasons from the positions of Leader of Higham Youth Club and Higham Pavilion Project. Joanne was heavily involved in the works and development of the Higham Pavilion Project and had worked tirelessly on the renovations and fund raising. She will continue with the Higham Youth Club until later in the summer. The Parish Councillors send all good wishes to Joanne for the future and thank her for her service to the community.

The new standing committee structure mentioned at the last meeting was agreed following further clarification from Vice-Chairman, Peter Allison. It is hoped this will streamline information brought to the council meetings. Each of the 3 separate committees, broken down as CDC: Community Development Committee, IFC Infrastructure Committee and EMC Executive Management Committee, will have a chairman and vice chairman. All the councillors are invited to sit on each of the committees when they are called, any decisions or actions required will then be brought to full council for discussion. This new system will be "trialed" for a period of 12 months, and then come under review.

Parishioners' matters were discussed and several questions raised by the parishioner present, each were responded to and queries clarified. Several Higham Village Plan discussion group meetings had been held during June. Information and ideas raised will be analysed ready for the next stage of the plan.

Gravesham Borough Councillor, Les Pearton, gave a short report which informed the council of the decision from Film Studios Paramount Pictures that they will be pulling out of the project on the Swanscombe peninsula, leaving the developer (London Resort Cony Holdings) to continue to submit the planning application on its own in November. Further information on what happens next is awaited.

All of the Councillors will soon be looking forward to the Gardens for Pleasure competition. Viewing will be taking place over the next month and awards will be presented later in the year to the winners.

There was a short break for refreshments. Planning applications were tabled and there were no objections raised.

The next meeting is on Monday September 11, at 7.30 pm Higham Memorial Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

75 Years Ago this August,
on the 9th of the month, St.
Teresa Benedicta of the Cross,
(also known as St. Edith Stein)
died.

St. Teresa was a convert from Judaism to Catholic Christianity. She later entered the Carmelite Order of Sisters but was to die in the Nazi concentration camp at Auschwitz.

Her birth on 12th October 1891 coincided with Yom Kippur,

the Jewish "day of atonement."

Edith Stein was just two years old when her father died. She gave up the practice of her Jewish faith as an adolescent.

A profoundly intellectually gifted young woman, Edith gravitated toward the study of philosophy, becoming a pupil of the renowned professor Edmund Husserl in 1913. Through her studies, the non-religious Edith met several Christians whose intellectual and spiritual lives she admired.

Earning a degree with the highest honours from Gottingen University in 1915, she then served as a nurse in an Austrian field hospital during World War I. Returning to academic work in 1916, she obtained a doctorate after writing a highly-regarded thesis on the phenomenon of empathy. She remained interested in the idea of religious commitment, but had not yet made such a commitment herself.

In 1921 while visiting friends Edith spent an entire night reading the autobiography of the 16th century Carmelite nun St. Teresa of Avila.

"When I had finished the book," she later recalled, "I said to myself: This is the truth." She was baptized on the first day of January, 1922

Edith intended to join the Carmelites immediately after her conversion, but ultimately had to wait another 11 years. Meanwhile she taught at a Dominican school, and gave numerous public lectures on women's issues. She spent 1931 writing a study of St. Thomas Aquinas, and took a university teaching position in 1932.

In 1933, the rise of Nazism, combined with Edith's Jewish ethnicity, put an end to her teaching career. After a painful parting with her mother, who did not understand her Christian conversion, she entered a Carmelite convent in 1934, taking the name "Teresa Benedicta of the Cross" as a symbol of her acceptance of suffering.

"I felt," she wrote, "that those who understood the Cross of Christ should take upon themselves on everybody's behalf." She saw it as her vocation "to intercede with God for everyone," but she prayed especially for the Jews of Germany whose tragic fate was becoming clear. "I ask the Lord to accept my life and my death," she wrote in 1939, "so that the Lord will be accepted by his people and that his kingdom may come in glory, for the salvation of Germany and the peace of the world."

After completing her final work, a study of St. John of the Cross entitled "The Science of the Cross," Teresa Benedicta was arrested along with her sister Rosa (who had also become a Catholic Christian), and the members of her religious community, on 7th August 1942. The arrests were a retaliation for the protest letter of the Dutch Bishops, decrying the Nazi treatment of Jews.

St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross died two days later in the concentration camp at Auschwitz on 9th August 1942.

Canonised by Pope Saint John Paul II in 1998, S.Tresa Benedicta of the Cross was proclaimed a co-patroness of Europe in 1999. She is one of six co-patrons alongside S.Bridget of Sweden, S. Catherine of Siena, S.Benedict of Nursia and Ss. Cyril and Methodius, apostles to the Slavs.

THAILAND'S HARSH WELCOME FOR CHRISTIAN REFUGEES

Pakistani Christians in Thailand are being held in desperate conditions, in an effort to make them go back to persecution in Pakistan.

The refugees include people like Ijaz, a 34-year-old who died this spring at the notorious Immigration Detention Centre in Bangkok. He had applied to the UNHCR for refugee status, but fallen ill at the IDC while waiting for his application to be processed. The IDC refused to allow local Christians to bring him any medicine.

Ijaz was one of around 4,000 Pakistani Christians who have fled persecution and ended up in Thailand. There they are treated harshly, and held in horrifically overcrowded conditions at the IDC. The medical care in the camp ranges from practically non-existent to actively harmful.

The Barnabas Fund is assisting Pakistani Christians seeking refuge in Thailand. It is providing food parcels for families, food aid for individuals languishing in the IDC, home-schooling materials, and help with critical medical needs. Food aid for a detainee in the IDC cost £6 per person per month. A monthly family food parcel costs £22 per month. Home-schooling materials for one child cost £15.
